Nature Tales:

November is a month of change in the wild world, and in the human world as well. It begins with U.S. voters electing five U.S. presidents were born in November:

- James Aik 2nd Nov 1789;
- Warren Harding 29 Nov 1875;
- James Garfield 19 Nov 1833;
- Franklin Pierce 23 Nov 1797;
- Richard Taylor 24th Nov 1789;
- Winston Churchill 30th Nov 1874.

The plant world goes dormant as autumn leaves complete their fall, snows come and put the forests and shrublands to sleep. Many birds have migrated south. Elk deer migrate to their winter range - having finished their rut. Bear, squirrel, marmot and bat are hibernating, as are skunks. A unique group undergoes a color change to white. The ermine (short-tail weasel), the snowshoe hare, the ptarmigan all turn pure white to match the snowy landscape they are active in all winter. Matching the white bark of the Aspen - disguised.

ELK DEER, MOOSE & CARIBOU antlers also change in the winter months. Antlers are on the male of these species. In the spring, long days trigger secretions in the pituitary gland to spur antler growth. As the antler grows, the outer layer is covered with velvet - blood circulation. Until the fall, when short days trigger decalcification, and velvet sheds when antlers are shed in winter.

MAINTAINING BISON, BISON, MUSKRAE, BIRCHON SHEEP have horns, and both male and female. The bony core is never shed for these species.
