October is the month for major wildlife migrations. Waterfowl in the Cascades flock to large lakes and rivers prior to their flights south bound. It's a great time to birdwatch. Hike up high mountain late in October and you are sure to see waterbirds. In 1997 October 11, I was hiking to Heather Lake with nephew

Tom. The lake was covered with mists and snows came on at a glorious sunset. The smells & sights were overwhelming in the wilderness late. But the highlight was the long low calls from a pair of loons.

What a gift to us lone hikers - the chortling of the most ancient of birds.

Ungulates are also migrating during October. Elk and deer have the most dramatic movements and offer prey base for carnivores such as grizzly bear, wolf and coyotes.
