Nature Tales:

The refreshing High Country in September is at its prettiest. Fall flowers are at season's end bloom, and seed set. Wildlife observations pick up on the mountains of September. Black bears can be found feeding on high elevation huckleberry fields. Pika and marmot are cutting their "hay" of grasses and forbs. Deer are finishing alpine meadow feeding, preparing for migration to the low country - out of deep snow. Ground Squirrels, marmots and chickadees work the ripe cones.

Lewis & Clark actually discovered the mountain goat Aug 24, 1805 in Lemhi, Idaho. Capt. C saw one at a distance today. (Notes from cutright 1805). Field Studies show mountain goats feed on leaves, conifer needles, shrub lichen.
